The Minister for Education and Skills (Huw Lewis): All materials, guidance and training provided by the Welsh Government to support the implementation of the National Literacy and Numeracy Framework (LNF) have been procured in accordance with Welsh Government Procurement Policy. The policy ensures that the Welsh Government buys goods and services that meet our business needs by providing sustainable and citizen focused solutions while maximizing the value we get from spending the Welsh pound.

The Welsh Government has produced a suite of bilingual online guidance materials on the LNF and has also developed a National Support Programme which offers direct support to all schools. Both these projects were procured through full and open competition. Welsh Government requirements for these projects were published through the Buy 4 Wales website, which in the case of the NSP was published throughout Europe. Expressions of interest were assessed in line with set tender evaluation criteria and the contract awarded to the tender offer which met the set criteria. Welsh Government Corporate Procurement Services oversee the administration of all tenders.

Huw Lewis: The Welsh Government is determined to ensure that all our schools are supported to implement the National Literacy and Numeracy Framework.

That is why we have put in place a package of bilingual support comprising the National Support Programme for Literacy and Numeracy and a suite of online guidance and training materials. We have already published curriculum planning guidance training workshops and Phase 1 Guidance to accompany the NSP. These are all available bilingually on the Learning Wales website.

Assessment-related guidance and classroom practice materials will be published on Learning Wales in September 2013 to coincide with statutory implementation, along with further guidance to company the next phase of support being provided to schools by the NSP. These will also all be bilingual.

Huw Lewis: I would refer you to the Written Statement made by the previous Minister for Education and Skills which advised that all local authorities were asked to confirm that they were undertaking their statutory duties in accordance with legislation and that their existing plans for the management of asbestos were reviewed.

All local authorities confirmed that they have plans in place and that these have been reviewed.

Asbestos is a non-devolved matter so there is no locus for the Welsh Government to monitor the quality of Asbestos Management Plans. Responsibility lies with the Health and Safety Executive (HSE) and local authority Environmental Health.

As part of a data collection on school buildings, which will be carried out later this year, my officials will again be asking local authorities to confirm whether there are asbestos plans in place for each of the schools in their area. This monitoring will take place annually as a matter of routine but on the basis of an assurance check only; in light of Asbestos being a non-devolved matter.

Health and safety legislation places duties on employers to ensure the health and safety of employees and others who may be affected, and this includes requirements for maintaining the buildings. The Control of Asbestos Regulations (2012) places specific duties on anyone with responsibility for maintenance and repair of non-domestic premises. Depending on who has those responsibilities the duty may be shared. Management of asbestos in schools rests with those responsible for their maintenance, for example the local authority. It is the HSE that checks for compliance with these requirements.

Should you have any concerns about schools in your area, I suggest you contact the local authority as they are best placed to provide you with further information.

Huw Lewis: Paragraph 18 of Schedule 2 to the School Governors' Annual Reports (Wales) Regulations 2011 requires: "A brief statement on the provision of toilet facilities at the school for pupils registered at the school and the arrangements in place for cleaning such toilet facilities."

All Governing bodies must include this information in their annual report. However this information is not collected by the school census data collection and is therefore not held centrally.

Huw Lewis: Of the 79 schools in Band 4 or Band 5 in 2011, 49 schools remain in Band 4 or Band 5 in 2012 (this number only includes schools that were open and placed in bands in both 2011 and 2012). However 61 out of the 79 Band 4 and 5 schools in 2011 saw improvements in the percentage of pupils achieving the Level 2 threshold including English/Welsh First Language and Mathematics (L2 incl. E/W & M) in 2012.

It is important to note that the secondary banding model is a relative model; it cannot be used to monitor change over time. This is because it is not known whether a change in band for a school is due to changes in performance in that school itself, or to other schools moving up or down the bands, changing its position without actual change in the performance in the school. This means that some improving schools may not have changed bands between 2011 and 2012. The detailed data published alongside the bands allows users to compare the individual indicators that are used to calculate the bands against previous data:

You may be interested to note that officials in the School Standards Delivery Division (SSDD) are conducting a priority review of Band 4 and 5 schools in 2011 (as well as those schools in Band 1) that have demonstrated improvements in their performance, so that lessons learnt can be shared with other schools, including those remaining in Band 4 or Band 5, to inform the improvement journey.

Huw Lewis: We are taking a number of steps to improve the way pupil referral units (PRUs) are run and how they perform. In 2011, the Welsh Government commissioned research to look at the delivery, planning and commissioning of education provision for children and young people outside the school setting, the largest element of which is PRUs. The ensuing report, which was published on 24 June, made a number of recommendations for the Welsh Government and local authorities, and my officials are currently considering how those recommendations will be taken forward. The recommendations include, for example, developing clear aims and purposes for PRUs, benchmarking frameworks for evaluating outcomes, and identifying, promoting and disseminating good examples of curricula in PRUs which meet current standards.

We are also planning to introduce new legislation in 2014 to make it a statutory requirement for local authorities to establish management committees for all their PRUs. We will support the introduction of the legislation with new guidance on the roles, responsibilities and constitution of management committees. The new legislation and guidance will help improve the leadership and management of PRUs, a concern highlighted in Estyn's 2011-12 Annual Report.

Huw Lewis: The previous Minister for Education and Skills agreed to continue providing further financial support in 2013-14 to secondary schools in Band 4 and 5 in 2012. In total 60 Band 4 and 24 Band 5 schools (giving a total of 84 secondary schools in Wales) will benefit from this additional funding which totals £840,000. We have seen that schools in Bands 4 and 5 last year have made real progress. This funding is intended to help schools which are in those bands this year deliver improvements for their learners.

In order to access the additional funding, schools have to submit clear action plans with improvement targets to their local consortium and subsequently the Welsh Government. These plans require schools to systematically track and monitor progress of the effectiveness of their intervention programmes. Targeted intervention programmes were evident in all of the plans for Band 4 and 5 schools in 2011, and Welsh Government officials have had regular discussions with consortia which focus on performance, school banding data, target-setting for school improvement and progress against actions. The action plans are quality assured and approved by officials in Schools Management and Effectiveness Division prior to the allocation of any funding.

Huw Lewis: Communication is key to the successful implementation of the Review of Qualifications. Recommendation 4 of the Review was that 'the Welsh Government should launch a substantial, long-term, UK-wide communication strategy to promote and explain the qualifications available in Wales'. Since the Welsh Government's acceptance of all the recommendations of the Review at the end of January, Ministers, Huw Evans and officials have engaged with a number of stakeholders through a range of channels and have developed a detailed implementation plan and draft communication strategy. The first meeting of our Stakeholder Reference Group, chaired by Huw Evans, will take place on 10 July. The group includes key strategic stakeholders from Wales and elsewhere in the UK. At its meeting the group will, amongst other things, discuss the draft communications strategy. I wish to take full account of the views of these stakeholders in the course of my consideration of the approach to communications. I will publish the communication strategy in the autumn. In the meantime, significant further engagement and communication will take place, including an update to all stakeholders on progress with implementation of the Review's recommendations, before the end of the school term.

Huw Lewis: The Carers Strategies (Wales) Measure 2010 placed a duty on Local Health Boards, working with their partner local authorities to develop and implement Carers Information and Consultation Strategies and it is through the development of local carers' strategies that we expect local authorities to consider the needs of young carers within schools and colleges.

Schools and colleges also have a clear responsibility to consider the impact of caring upon the right of young carers to education (Articles 28 and 29 of the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child).

Welsh Government outlined the actions required by local authorities to support young carers through its Carers' Strategy which was updated in 2007. A formal study of the Carers' Strategy was commissioned by Welsh Government the findings of which were published in July 2010. Overall, the report was relatively positive about the impact of the Carers' Strategy, concluding that it had promoted organisations to reconsider the ways in which carers are supported and to begin to develop new types of services and support. It noted also that legislative changes relating to assessment of carer needs were reported to have had a positive effect on the commissioning and delivery of services.

Much has been achieved in terms of policy, legislation and service development for both carers and young carers since the strategy was last reviewed in 2007, for example, in April 2013 an on-line toolkit was launched for professionals working in health, social care and education, who come into contact with young carers and young adult carers. Further information on these achievements is set out within the Carers' Strategy for Wales 2013. A link to the strategy is below.

Mark Drakeford: Methylphenidate hydrochloride is used in the treatment of ADHD, which is diagnosed and treated within mainstream child and adolescent mental health and Paediatric health services in common with other conditions, with treatment provided on the basis of clinical need of the individual.

The diagnosis and treatment of ADHD is guided by NICE guidelines, which provides independent, authoritative and evidence-based guidance on the most effective ways to prevent, diagnose and treat disease and ill health. As with all NICE guidelines, responsibility for delivery lies with the Health Boards. Medication is also used together with therapeutic interventions and their use is based on the needs of the individual, and it is good practice for professionals to regularly review medication and other treatment options to ensure they reflect the needs of the individual.

Our national mental health strategy, Together for Mental Health, recognises the importance of tackling issues early to prevent problems developing later in life. In this respect it seeks to build resilience and develop coping strategies among young people, in addition to other interventions such as medication to treat mental health problems, including ADHD, in order that the individual may fulfil their potential.

All Local Health Boards (LHBs) have a responsibility to monitor the use of controlled drugs within their locality including those used in the treatment of ADHD. Information on controlled drug prescribing is available to LHBs from the NHS Wales Shared Services Partnership. Each LHB's Accountable Officer and Local Intelligence Network are expected to keep controlled drug prescribing under review.

Mark Drakeford: The DSM-5, the fifth version of the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders was reviewed in May for the first time since 1994, but it is important to note the manual –

which classified the variety of mental illnesses – is more commonly used in the US. This is work undertaken internationally by experts in the field of classification rather than governments.

The Welsh Government and NHS Wales use the International Classification of Diseases (ICD), as do other World Health Organisation member states, to classify diseases and other conditions. The tenth version of the ICD has been in use since 1994 and work on the eleventh revision will continue into 2015.

Mark Drakeford: Whilst the National Institute for Social Care and Health Research (NISCHR) does not fund Cardiff University Brain Imaging Research Centre (CUBRIC) directly, there is potential for CUBRIC collaboration with the NISCHR-funded Biomedical Research Centre (the National Centre for Mental Health - NCMH) and the Advanced Image Analysis and Visualisation Biomedical Research Unit (AMIAV). For example, there is a live Diffusion Tensor Imaging project on the AMIVA research portfolio which is collaboration with CUBRIC.

Similarly, with support from NCMH, Neuroimaging facilities at CUBRIC are currently being upgraded for imaging participant volunteers. NCMH imaging work is progressing well, with the Control participants being imaged for the '100 Brains' and the '1000 Brains' studies. Patient imaging protocols are currently being developed with the aim of having approvals in place by mid 2013.

NISCHR runs open and competitive grant schemes, which are open to researchers in Wales across a wide range of disease areas, including CUBRIC staff or researchers looking to work with or utilise CUBRIC in their project. One example is a PhD Studentship project, led by Professor David Linden of Cardiff University. Within the project timetable CUBRIC was used for the scanning and testing of patients, and will be used for the subsequent data analysis.

Mark Drakeford: The learning from the three Chronic Conditions Management Demonstrator sites was shared with Health Boards and is published on http://www.ccmdemonstrators.com/. Health Boards have made good progress with developing new and improved models of care and support, based on the Demonstrator learning and other good practice established in response to Setting the Direction.

On 25 June, I launched the Delivering Local Health Care Plan. This aims to accelerate the pace of change to provide more services, care and support closer to home - and have a specific focus on supporting people with long term conditions.

Later this month I will also be issuing for consultation a companion plan setting out a framework for integrated health and social care for older people with complex needs.

The implementation of the Review is being taken forward by Local Health Boards in accordance with the plans they have developed and through their local mechanisms. There has been significant progress across Wales implementing its recommendations.

Betsi Cadwaladr University Health Board have established the North Wales Neurosciences Network to take work forward.

A National Specialist Advisory Group for Neurosciences is being established to provide advice on the ongoing implementation.

Mark Drakeford: The raising of awareness and improvements in early diagnosis of musculoskeletal conditions are the responsibility of LHBs in Wales and continued compliance with the current commissioning directives are key to maintaining the progress made on these issues.

Health Boards have been encouraged to establish more robust community pain services linked with secondary care to support more effective pain management. Through my Orthopaedic Board we specifically tasked LHBs to improve community pain services and I will be looking at what progress we have made through this work. LHBs and NHS Trusts will also ensure effective modern technologies are in place to facilitate early assessment and diagnosis of arthritis and musculoskeletal conditions.

LHBs were set a target of a minimum of 95% compliance against the directives, and in an audit of progress against all the chronic conditions service directives, conducted in 2011, LHBs achieved 97% compliance with the Arthritis and Musculoskeletal Directive, and 87% of the actions within the Pain Directive. I will be asking the Pain Sub Group of the National Specialist Advisory Group for Anaesthesia to carry out audit of pain services, to understand progress since 2011 with the intention of reporting by October 2013.
