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Questions to the First Minister

Questions to the Minister for Environment, Sustainability and Housing

Kirsty Williams (Brecon and Radnorshire): Why has the Welsh Assembly Government's Acceptable Cost Guidance gauged it to be more expensive to develop social housing in the Ringland area of Newport than in Maescar? (WAQ52323)

The Minister for Environment, Sustainability and Housing (Jane Davidson): Acceptable Cost Guidance (ACG) figures comprise three components—land values, building costs and on-costs, where on-costs are expected to cover all the Registered Social Landlord's (RSL) own costs in developing a social housing scheme. The current six ACG cost bands reflect the variation in land values across Wales.

The Welsh Assembly Government obtains independent advice on Welsh residential land values from the District Valuer (DV), who has offices throughout Wales. The DV's advice is presented on the basis of the value of one acre of residential land, and individual values are attributed to every community council (CC) in Wales.

The nominal values for each ACG band, and the range it encompasses, is determined by the Assembly Government based on the DV's advice. Land value advice received by WAG from the DV in June 2008 broadly supports the current ACG band positions of Maescar and Ringland within the October 2007 ACG document.

Peter Black (South Wales West): How many homes were sold under the right to buy or right to acquire by (a) Local Authorities and (b) RSLs in the financial year 2007-2008? (WAQ52325)

Jane Davidson: During the financial year 2007-08, there were 819 completed sales of local authority dwellings via the right to buy scheme. A total of 52 dwellings were sold by RSLs: 30 sold via right to buy and 22 by right to acquire.

Peter Black (South Wales West): How many homes were demolished by (a) Local authorities and (b) RSLs in the financial year 2007-2008? (WAQ52326)

Jane Davidson: The figures for the financial year 2007-08 are not currently available, as they are not due for publication until the 27 August 2008.

Peter Black (South Wales West): How many affordable houses have been completed by (a) Local authorities (b) RSLs (c) via S.106 agreements and (d) other bodies in the financial year 2007-2008? (WAQ52327)

Jane Davidson: During 2007-08, there were 343 new dwellings completed by RSLs, and five completed by local authorities. Information on section 106 agreements and affordable homes completed by other bodies is not currently held centrally.

The data collected on affordable housing are currently being reviewed and it is planned that a more comprehensive set of data will be collected from April 2009, which will include some retrospective statistics.

Questions to the Minister for Heritage

Alun Cairns (South Wales West): What consideration has the Minister given to the use of disused ships for the creation of artificial diving reefs around the Welsh coast? (WAQ52318)

Alun Cairns (South Wales West): Has the Minister given any consideration to the creation of artificial diving reefs around the Welsh coast? (WAQ52319)

The Minister for Heritage (Alun Ffred Jones): I am not currently considering any specific provision for artificial diving reefs and this is a matter that would have to be considered in the light of the draft Marine and Coastal Access Bill which contains provisions to introduce marine planning for integrated use of our marine and coastal resources. In addition to this, we are in the process of finalising a Coastal Tourism Strategy for Wales which identifies a number of opportunities to attract more visitors with new and exciting water-based activities including diving.

Irene James (Islwyn): What is the Welsh Assembly Government doing to support commercial radio in Wales? (WAQ52322)

Alun Ffred Jones: Though broadcasting is not devolved to the Welsh Assembly Government, we are making £100,000 per annum available to support community radio stations for the next five years.

Questions to the Minister for Social Justice and Local Government

Irene James (Islwyn): Can communities who did not bid for Communities First status bid for Communities Next status? (WAQ52321) Transferred to Leighton Andrews, Deputy Minister for Regeneration

The Deputy Minister for Regeneration (Leighton Andrews): No. We have no proposals to expand the Communities First programme that now covers over 160 areas and 20 per cent of the population of Wales.

The consultation document on the future of the Communities First programme made clear the Assembly Government's view that regular and frequent changes to the make-up of the Communities First programme were not sustainable in the long term. We stated that we did not envisage any additions to the programme based on the Welsh Index of Multiple Deprivation 2008. None of the responses to the consultation dissented from this view.
